

Travelling Head

Racehorse Training

Job Summary

A travelling head is part of the stable staff team responsible for all duties required to take mares and foals to stallion farms during the breeding season, yearlings to sales, racehorses to the racecourse, or horses to the vet clinic.



Main Duties

- -Take charge of horse's travelling from the training yard to race meetings arranging all requirements to ensure the horses are kept in the best possible condition;
- Ensure horse's equipment is transported safely;
- Oversee the saddling of the horses at race meetings and leading into the paddock before the race;
- Take charge of the horse after the race and prepare them for their next journey;
- Manage and allocate workload to the stable staff team at the races;
- Represent the trainer when required, declaring and speaking to the jockey and owners;
- Maintain relationships with stable staff, owners and other industry personnel;
- Maintain an awareness of national & international racing industry trends and demands;

Case Study

Racehorse Training

Ireland has some of the leading trainers in the world amongst its 372 public trainers and 248 restricted licence holders. Whilst there are areas of concentration, notably the Curragh being a global centre of excellence for thoroughbred racehorse training, trainers are located in 31 of Ireland's 32 counties. The largest trainers account for a relatively

high proportion of horses in training. In 2016 the largest 32 yards accounted for over 3,500 horses, 45% of all horses in training. At the opposite end of the spectrum the smallest 166 yards accounted for less than 900 horses (11%).

Experience

Travelling heads will typically have experience as stable staff and or exercise riders in racing yards and will have accompanied horses racing on numerous occasions prior to progressing to the role. High standards and a good work ethic are absolutely essential.

Certification

No Certification is Required.

Trainers are required to apply for a Racing Establishment Card issued by the Irish Horse Racing Board (I.H.R.B.) within 5 days of commencement of employment for all staff within their stable yard.

Working Conditions

Dedication is needed as travelling heads are up early and outside in all weathers, this role requires near constant travel to and from various racecourses.

Pay & Benefits

Generally, the amount of pay you receive for working is a matter of agreement between you and your employer, these negotiations normally occur when you receive a job offer. The racing industry have an agreed minimum rate of pay as well as other minimum conditions of employment for Irish stable staff including entitlements to sick pay and stable employee bonus scheme.
